

AAUW Ashland Celebration of Scholars: Our 2018–19 Women Scholars

The long journey to university for Arismendi Villa-Saucedo began more than 15 years ago when her mother crossed the United States-Mexico border with her nine children in search of a better life for them. Today Arismendi, the youngest child is the first in her family to attend college.

As a mother of three, Amber Stone and her husband supported their children's education as the priority. Returning to school after 22 years, Amber now resumes her own college dream despite a recent setback of serious illness.

Eight women scholars were honored at the annual Celebration of Scholars, hosted by AAUW Ashland members and donors. Family, friends, and college officials were treated to a program and reception. See the Celebration Program for profiles of our students.

Thanks to the generosity of our members and donors, AAUW Ashland awarded \$26,500 to our eight scholars for the 2018-19 academic year. These tuition scholarships are used at Rogue Community College (RCC) and our partner school, Southern Oregon University (SOU).

"Once again AAUW women helping women to succeed was celebrated by our giving academic scholarships for the coming year," said Kate Wolf-Pizor, Scholarship Co-Chair.



AAUW Oregon State Convention

Four members from our Ashland Branch attended the AAUW Oregon State Convention in Hillsboro on April 20-22: Gretchen King, Pam Shay, Bessie Azari, and Paula Wiiken.

The keynote speaker was Dr. Melody Rose, President of Marylhurst University. Dr. Rose is a nationally recognized scholar of women and politics, and she gave a rousing speech about how to elect more women to public office.

Trish Garner, our AAUW Public Policy Chair for Oregon, moderated a truly interesting panel of women who currently serve in the Oregon legislature. The legislators discussed many issues, including what changes they hope to accomplish while in office, challenges they face, and how to encourage more women to run.

There were many breakout sessions with interesting speakers. Elizabeth Estabrooks, the Oregon Women Veterans Coordinator, spoke movingly of how society ignores women veterans and ways we might honor them better. Her talk, "I am not Invisible," was accompanied by powerful large photos of women veterans.

Amy Neel is the Construction Training Director at Oregon Tradeswomen, Inc. At loose ends after college graduation, Amy became a carpenter and worked many happy years in the trades. Her enthusiasm for this career led her to her current job: selecting and training low income women to work in the building trades. The end goal is to earn a living wage and build a successful career. Amy's enthusiasm for working with her hands was infectious.

Sunday morning our attendees enjoyed meeting with other women in the Southern District to share successes and strategies.

Often a college education is prioritized for boys and men, and downplayed for girls and women. Using examples from their own lives, Dr. Susan Walsh, SOU Provost, and Dr. Cathy Kemper-Pells, RCC President, encouraged all the scholars to pursue their academic degrees and to continue their own journeys of learning.

"For 28 years AAUW Ashland scholarships have given women the necessary financial boost to continue and finish their degrees, ensuring that they will obtain meaningful work for the future and contribute to their communities and themselves," said Peggy Moore, Celebration of Scholars Co-Chair.

Priscilla Arnold, MD has mentored AAUW Ashland scholars over the years. She remarked: "While women have been increasingly successful in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) careers, there continues to be disparity in a number of fields.

Our scholarship committee was pleased to award scholarships to women pursuing three different STEM pathways this year: Caitlin Diefendorf, pre-medicine; Nomi Macadangdang, mathematics; and Isabella Ruikis, environmental engineering."

A first and a last for SOU programs mark the achievements of two scholars. At SOU, Samara Diab, the Judy Yin Shih scholar, will be the last French major to graduate, while Stacey Vance will be the first graduate in the new Masters program of Outdoor Adventure and Expedition Leadership. Samara: "Throughout my life, following in the footsteps of parents courageous enough to start over somewhere new time after time, I have cultivated the ability to create."

Without thoughts of higher education,
Mitzi Grannis has worked to break the chain
of addiction in her family. At RCC, she
discovered that she loves learning, and this
success has fueled her imagination—so many
possibilities to choose from.

Kate Wolf-Pizor: "One of AAUW's core values is passing the gift of education forward. Our mission and cooperative work with an eye on the prize enriches us all. Consider joining us in this rewarding work."

Donor Spotlight: Kate and Jim Wolf-Pizor

Kate and Jim Wolf-Pizor have made an incredibly generous cash gift of \$50,000 to the AAUW SOU Endowment Fund, a "March to a Million" Campaign gift that translates into \$100,000 when matched dollar for dollar by the Campaign's anonymous match donors.

At their home we visited with Kate and Jim and asked them about themselves and why they chose to give so generously to the Endowment Fund.

Kate and Jim have lived in Ashland for four years and Kate has been a member of AAUW Ashland for just about as long. They lived in the San Francisco Bay Area before moving here, but were no strangers to Ashland, having come for vacations for 25 years.

Kate was introduced to our Ashland branch of AAUW by Rae Otto, who took Kate to a Celebration of Scholars event just after she relocated here. "That event moved me so deeply," Kate said, "The impact of those scholarships on those women's lives was something I never forgot."

Asked why she and Jim decided to contribute to the SOU Endowment Fund, Kate replied, "Everybody's daughter deserves a chance for an education. We are still living in a society that does not value women enough. It is the job of women who have completed a degree to help the next generation."

Jim, too, was affected by what he has witnessed at the Celebration of Scholars events. "So many of these women are the first in their families to attend college. That takes a lot of courage and hard work. I feel lucky that we are able to help them with scholarships that enable them to pursue their educational goals."

Kate's mother died in April this year and Kate talked about her as an example of philanthropic generosity. "My mother was a long-time member of AAUW and a generous contributor to scholarships for women." Kate and Jim are definitely continuing her mother's legacy.

AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund

Over the years, I have attended AAUW Oregon conventions and listened to the personal stories of brave plaintiffs seeking legal redress for Title VII, Title IX, equal pay, and sexual harassment. This year, Paul Thein, former athletic director at Feather River Community College, in the small town of 8,000, told his story of "turning in an abuser in the California mountains."

I will tell you more about Paul after an introduction to AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF).

For 33 years, AAUW's LAF has supported more than 100 cases and supplied millions of dollars to balance the scales for people working toward gender equity through the legal system. The Fund pays legal fees, becomes an amicus signatory, and AAUW members attend legal proceedings. The program supports cases that have the potential to set or reinforce precedent for future cases on gender discrimination.

In 2005, Paul Thein advocated for equal treatment of women's and men's coaching staffs at Feather River. He supported hiring a gay woman as a full-time tenured basketball head coach. That same summer, a male faculty member supplied alcohol and sexually assaulted female students at an Upward Bound sports camp for disadvantaged students, sponsored by the college. Paul was called to the camp and subsequently reported the incident to police. The perpetrator's father was an influential tenured faculty member. Paul and two female coaches lost their jobs in retaliation. Overwhelmed and drained, they came to LAF for help in 2007. LAF reimbursed \$90,000 in lawyer fees, sat in court many times and gave Paul's family a Christmas that year. The case took 14 years to settle, the longest in AAUW's history. The female coaches settled in 2014. Paul was awarded \$2 million in 2016. He now speaks to AAUW members across the country through LAF Case Support Travel Grants.

Keeping Ashland Women Safe

Keeping Ashland Women Safe (K.A.W.S.) is a task force comprised of concerned citizens who have come together in response to violence and threats of violence against women in Ashland. The mission of K.A.W.S. is to provide a platform for ongoing community awareness and action to ensure women's safety in Ashland, through social media; safety, prevention, and empowerment training; and active culture change. This group was initiated by Alaya Ketani, an AAUW member and Co-Chair of the Jackson County Council Against Domestic and Sexual Violence. (Please note: This task force is a separate entity from the Jackson County Council.) She was motivated to create this task force by the women who have contacted her to share their stories of assault and abuse, and by the recent assault of a female employee in an Ashland restaurant.

K.A.W.S. has rallied support from key organizations in Ashland, including Chief O'Meara of Ashland Police Department, Sexual Assault Response Team (SART), Community Works Advocacy Team, Ashland Culture of Peace Commission, and Peace House.
