October Branch Meeting

Saturday, October 18, 5-7:30 pm

"Women in Russia and Japan: Close-up views"—Learn what lives are like for women today in two different parts of the world. Our guest speakers are Michelle Carter journalist and author of "From Under the Russian Snow," and Kimie Oshima, professor of socio-linguistics at Kanagawa University in Tokyo.



I had the pleasure of attending the AAUW Oregon Leadership Conference in Bend for 2 days in August. It was an opportunity not only to get away from the smoky skies but also to spend time with a group of engaging women who are AAUW state or branch officers.

The keynote speaker was Nita Belles, executive director of In Our Backyard, an organization that identifies and rescues women being trafficked. We learned that the most effective method to rescue women is with information in bathroom stalls. Oregon HB 3143 requires that information be placed at all the rest stops in Oregon. One-third of rescued women are freed because someone noticed something suspicious and alerted authorities.

- Don't ask a woman if she is in bondage but rather engage her in conversation and observe her responses.
- Does she make eye contact?
- Does someone answer for her?
- Does someone attempt to end your interaction?

As individuals we can make a difference.

Trish Garner, state public policy guru, is always an exciting speaker at AAUW events. Trish and her committee have scheduled an appointment with House Speaker Tina Kotek to discuss the accusations of sexual harassment among elected officials. Their message is that AAUW expects all sexual harassment accusations to be investigated thoroughly and in a timely manner.

Trish has identified the enforcement of Title IX as the #1 priority for AAUW public policy. She has received support from legislatures of both parties in support of increased funds for the Title IX state employee. This was exciting news. (Oregon currently has only a one-quarter time employee responsible for all training and enforcement of Title IX.) As an organization we can make a difference.

As we deal with one of the local repercussions of climate change, summer smoke, and struggle with our national identity, I know we, as AAUW women, will rise out of our despair and continue to work for a safer fairer country for women and girls.



Vicky Giffin, AAUW member and a member of the Scholarship Endowment Committee, recently made a generous \$10,000 bequest gift to the March to a Million Endowment Campaign.

From June 8 Planning Retreat

New Treasurer

Sonja Friedman has stepped forward to take on the responsibilities of the financial officer. She was approved by a vote of the Board.

Branch Calendar and Programs

We had a lot of discussion about possible speakers for our 2018–19 Branch meetings. The Branch does not have funds to reimburse speakers. There was a request that discussions should relate to AAUW’s mission, and although there should be a mixture of Saturday and weekday evening times, we do not want evening meetings in the winter.

Membership

Priscilla Arnold, outgoing membership chair, reported that 189 members had renewed, and 16 members did not renew. We discussed how to make new members feel welcome. Chris Licata proposed providing a map of members’ addresses in the Directory to encourage carpooling.

Venue

We are spending a high proportion of our income on rent at SOU. Members have also expressed dissatisfaction with the parking at SOU and our location in the basement. The only other venue in Ashland that seems to fit our needs is the Fellowship Hall at the Methodist Church. The consensus was that the Masonic Lodge was not attractive enough. Mimi Pippel volunteered to negotiate for rental and parking fees at SOU.

Strategic Plan

Sandra Coyner, Branch parliamentarian, led a discussion on what we thought worked well and what we could do better after our experiences of 2017–18. The positives included great programs, the membership committee, the Celebration of Scholars event, and the holiday party. Suggested improvements included honoree attendance at the Annual Meeting in April, improved attendance at the April meeting (it conflicted with the Film Festival this year), room in the budget for nonbudgeted items, members not being asked for

money constantly, and need for better communication from Public Policy. A detailed discussion of the strategic plan was postponed due to lack of time.

Fundraising

Garage Sale

Bessie Azari and Paula Wiiken have volunteered to coordinate a garage sale, which will be held May 18–19. AAUW will reserve the Bellview Grange May 15–19. They are looking for a committee of 8 to guide the planning.

Fundraising Parties

Sarah Seybold presented a fundraising concept of members hosting themed parties and charging guests to attend. This concept has been very successful for raising large amounts of money at her church (Trinity Episcopal). Further discussion around this idea was postponed due of lack of time.

March to a Million

Jean Conger updated the attendees on this endowment campaign for SOU. Bequests and donations of any size are welcome. Jean is looking for two members to serve on the endowment committee.

Conclusion

The following comments were made regarding the meeting: (1) we needed more time for the strategic plan; (2) we spent too much time talking about the venue, so Mimi volunteered to get a 2-year commitment on rent from SOU; and (3) there was good participation.

PUBLIC POLICY

Women's Equality Day, August 26th

On August 19, 1920, after a grueling special session, Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the Nineteenth Amendment. Six days later Secretary of State Colby signed the Proclamation granting American women the right to vote. Whistles and bells sounded around the country in tribute to the new women voters.

In 1973 Bella Abzug (D-NY) spearheaded a drive in the U.S. Congress to designate August 26th as "Women's Equality Day." Her famous quote was never more true than today: "This woman's place is in the House – the House of Representatives!" Record numbers of women are heeding this call and running for office in 2018.

The trailblazing suffragists did not stop their advocacy once they achieved their momentous victory. The League of Women Voters sprang out of a 1920 suffragist convention and has helped millions of women and men become informed participants in government.

AAUW reminds us that although achieving the vote was a great step, we must keep raising our voices for women's equality. This includes knowing state ballot issues, inspiring young women to vote, and supporting issues through the AAUW Two-Minute Activist.

If you enjoy women's history, take a look at "The Women's Hour" by Elaine Weiss. This compelling book vividly describes how the suffragists convinced the Tennessee legislature to ratify the Nineteenth Amendment. This book reminds us to celebrate these amazing women (and men) who persisted until women's suffrage became the law of the land.
