I've recently volunteered at a few local flu clinics around the valley and have been honing my injection skills while helping the elderly community to stay protected this upcoming season. While nursing school and children have been keeping me busy, I'm still a country girl at heart and have spent the last three months helping my parents with the fall harvest at their farm.

It is a very different experience, but I am thankful that the school [RCC] found a way to help us get our hours to still graduate on time. The hospitals also have been accommodating to our changes.

Along with my own full time schooling, I am also homeschooling my children. This has left me feeling very thankful for their past teachers, and I am humbled by the amount of work it takes. I am expecting a baby girl and our family is very excited to introduce a new member early this summer. Afterwards I hope to be applying for a surgical RN position at the local hospitals.

In Her Own Words: Cause to Celebrate

Wolf-Pizor Family Scholar, SOU Undergraduate McNair Scholar, English major with a Certificate in Native American Studies

I was accepted to the University of California San Diego in Ethnic Studies PhD program, to begin in fall 2020. UCSD offered me four years guaranteed funding, including a \$2,000 moving scholarship, guaranteed housing, and health insurance. For the first two years I don't need to teach and I have been awarded a \$22,000 fellowship per year. I am excited to begin this new adventure and further my goals to work with tribal communities to combat the endemic issues around Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Two Spirit folks, a movement that raises awareness about the epidemic of Native women going missing or being killed.

The scholarship has helped add a substantial breath of air for me, allowing me to purchase my books, parking passes, and other items without having to worry. This quarter [spring 2020] I am managing, but it's difficult in these times. Our club's [Native American Student Union] annual powwow and SOU commencement have been cancelled. These exciting spring events gave me energy and joy, now put on hold.

The long-term economic outlook forecasts significant financial challenges ahead. But we are grateful that our colleges, their respective foundations and staff have instituted standards that support students and donors alike. AAUW Ashland Branch's 2020 -21 Agenda

The Public Policy committee usually takes its lead from the State Public Policy Committee and its chair Trish Garner when we strategize about our coming year's priorities and focus. Those state priorities are always subject to change as we move closer to the opening of the Oregon Legislative Session in February 2021, but our team likes to use the summer months to start researching an issue.

At our April Zoom meeting, we discussed several topics of interest:

- Gender diversity on company boards
- Civics education in our schools
- Rollout of the Student Success legislation
- Child care needs of college students

After discussion, the team was most interested in the topic of gender diversity on company boards. Prior to our May Zoom meeting, the team will do some preliminary information gathering to determine if this issue is one that we want to address in the coming year. We welcome member feedback on these four issues and their level of interest.

AAUW National's 2020-21 Agenda focuses on three main areas:

AAUW Oregon's 2020-21 Agenda

The 2020 Oregon Legislative Session was cut short due to Republican legislators leaving the capitol building prior to the official end date. Therefore, none of the bills of interest to AAUW of Oregon passed.

The top three priorities were:

- HB 4076 Establishing a Taskforce on Age Discrimination.
- HB 4131 Providing Statutory
 Authorization and Funding for the
 Family Preservation Project at Coffee
 Creek Correction Facility.
- HB 4132 Requiring Oregon Health Authority & Oregon Department of Education to administer and collect data from student health surveys.

Bills actively supported:

- HB 4005 Requiring firearms to be secured with a trigger or cable lock and in a locked container.
- SB 4010 Providing for disconnection of Oregon from the federal "Opportunity Zone" tax break.
- HB 4040 Establishing a Family
 Treatment Court Pilot project in five
 counties including Jackson County.
- HB 4112 Expanding funding for high school staff to teach a child abuse prevention program and create Children's Advocacy Centers.
- HB 4133 Funding to locate domestic violence advocates in DHS offices.
- HB 1540 Providing a licensing framework for student loan service providers.

- HB 1566 Allowing foster children to qualify for Oregon Promise based on the highest educational level they achieved while placed out of state.
- HB 4055 Requiring a study and recommendations on how community colleges and universities can combat food and housing insecurity among students.
- HB 4104 Authorizing political contributions to be used to defray both health insurance premiums and caregiving expenses.
- HB4098 Directing the Department of Education to develop a statewide, long term strategic plan to provide computer science education to all schools by the 2025-2026 school year.
- HB 4160 Establishing a Taskforce on Student Success for underrepresented students in higher education.
- SB 1522 Modifying definitions of "sexual conduct and "student" for purposes of requirements for education providers related to abuse of sexual conduct toward students.
- SB 1538 Authorizing various jurisdictions to adopt ordinances limiting the possession of firearms in public buildings on the basis of having a concealed handgun license.

We are hopeful that many of these bills will be reintroduced in the 2021-2022 Legislative Session.

Scholarships Available for Childcare Expenses

Last fall during the "welcome to campus" orientation at SOU, Mimi Pippel hosted an AAUW table that advertised our mission of "Empowering Women Since 1881." Several women stopped by the table with children in strollers and suggested AAUW could best empower women by assisting with childcare costs.

The Schneider Children's Center and the Student Associations at RCC and SOU have provided childcare subsidies in the past. Unfortunately, those programs were terminated as budgets tightened.

This year, in partnership with both RCC and SOU, the AAUW Board modified our scholarship program to include childcare expenses. The criteria for the scholarships will remain the same: female, 3.25 GPA, full-time student, demonstrated leadership ability, community service, and financial need. Scholarships will first be used to cover RCC and SOU costs for tuition, room and board, books, fees, and supplies charged to a student's account. Any remaining balance in the student account may be applied to childcare expenses.

RCC and SOU have already established the program requirements. The student must:

- Be a parent or the legal caregiver of the child;
- Enroll their child in a DHS-approved program;
- Maintain at least 8 on-campus credits while receiving the subsidy;
- Remain in 'good academic standing;
 and
- Continue making adequate progress toward graduation.

The subsidy will be awarded in one full amount each term. The maximum amount of the subsidy is calculated at \$400/month, 3 months/ term, and for three terms (fall, winter, and spring only), or a total of \$1,200/term and \$3,600/year. Once awarded, students need only verify eligibility to continue receiving the subsidy for the duration of that academic year.

Games, Genealogy, Knitting & Dining


