She was a dual member with the Medford Branch and involved in many activities with both branches. Joan was our treasurer/ finance officer from about 2003 to 2010 -- she volunteered for two-year obligation and stayed for seven. She was still listed as AAUW Funds Chair in 2014, the last year she was an active member. Her commitment to AAUW is truly admirable.

Joan grew up in Duluth, Minnesota through high school. On a visit to California, she met and married Dick Enloe. She started her family of four children while attending SOU, graduating with a degree in accounting. She kept books professionally for many years including for her husband's business and several organizations. Dick died in 2011.

In addition to her AAUW work, Joan owned a Diet Center franchise, was a member of the Bear Creek Greenway Foundation, and Southern Oregon Land Conservancy. She also was a major leader of the Rogue Valley Women's Alliance, a women's networking group which grew out of an Ashland AAUW women's dinner at SOU.

Cultivating: Healing, Resilience and Gardens

SOU graduate, Clinical Mental Health Counseling; the Judy Yin Shih – AAUW Ashland Scholarship

As a graduate student in SOU's Clinical Mental Health Counseling program, I am learning skills for supporting clients' healing and resilience, both in coursework and through hands-on clinical experience. Offering counseling via telehealth to help clients cope with the challenges of the pandemic and fires while also healing their own personal traumas, has offered me powerful growth, learning, and sense of purpose in being of service during such challenging times.

The AAUW Ashland Judy Yin Shih Scholarship support allowed me to choose an internship site that aligns best with my values of holistic, person-centered care, and of providing access for low-income people. At the Community Counseling Center of Ashland, I receive exceptional training and guidance from my supervisors, along with the encouragement to cultivate my own therapeutic orientation.

I was grateful to use the skills I am learning as a volunteer at the Jackson County Expo, offering emotional support to evacuees after the Almeda Fires, and helping people access much-needed resources. I have also continued my volunteer work in a rural sustainability collective called Viridaea. In response to the destabilizing pandemic and fires, we built an additional food garden to donate vegetables to people in need.

This past winter I trained in Eye Movement

Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) Therapy,
which has been my dream since before applying to my
graduate program. EMDR helps clients reprocess and heal
from painful past memories while maintaining safety and
presence, by engaging the brain's right and left hemispheres.
It is amazingly beautiful to see how this process can
resolve stuck patterns, heal trauma, and return a sense of
empowerment to those I work with. I am continually so
deeply moved by seeing clients' post-traumatic growth
bloom through their courageous healing work.

After graduating in June, I plan to continue at the Community Counseling Center, and then build a private practice specializing in healing trauma and prioritizing working with low-income clients. I am eager to begin offering services in Spanish as well, integrating my undergraduate major and past focus, once I am fully trained. I also may pursue a doctorate degree in the future, as I aspire to contribute to research that can help support access to trauma-informed care. My long-term dream is to create a wilderness therapy program for trauma survivors, integrating my passion for holistic, embodied therapy, and the peace I know in gardening and nature. I am so grateful for the AAUW's support on my path and I am dedicated to carrying forward such uplifting energy by serving our community as a counselor.

Tending Our Garden of Scholars

Spring has arrived in Ashland despite pandemics and fires. Spring energy remembers and sends up new growth to enrich our lives. So, it is now time for AAUW Ashland to tend and increase our Garden of Scholars. The best gardens are the ones that have variety and stamina, and we cultivate those qualities year after year.

By May 1, we have selected and recommended the scholars to award at each of our partner schools, Southern Oregon University (SOU) and Rogue Community College (RCC). Cristina Sanz and Stephanie Hanigan from SOU and Anna Manley from RCC are vital in our scholarship process. They provide accountability and equal access among many items—from financial aid qualification, school transcripts, to managing interview meetings (on Zoom again this year). They ensure that we act with confidentiality while ensuring we have all the information needed to deliberate fairly. They provide us with a pool of applicants that meet our specific criteria and then our AAUW Ashland Scholarship Committee examines and reviews the record of each qualifying student. It is always amazing that we get such variety of interests and expertise in our applicants. What a joy to be part of their process and growth!

So stay tuned to see how you can help at the Celebration of Scholars event tentatively scheduled in October 2021 where we will introduce our scholars! Your friendly faces of support, belief, and personal encouragement are what each of our students appreciates along with the scholarship tuition assistance.

Thanks to you, our endowment funds at both SOU and RCC are steadily growing and providing annual yields that make a good harvest to allow us to increase the dollar amounts for scholars year by year. Together, we are making a difference in the lives of women. We know that an education is the single best thing to give a woman that will

benefit her and her family for life and future generations. As Rumi said, "The Garden of the World had no limits except in your mind."

Based on our Greatest Needs donations totaling \$9,432, we achieved 16 Named Gift Honorees. This is an Ashland Branch record. Our awardees were recognized at the Oregon Convention in April and each will receive a certificate. Here, for their service in 2020, are our honored members:

- Our one major donor, having given \$1000, has awarded her Named Gift Honor to Sylvie Whitman for her dedicated effort on the Dollars for Scholars campaign.
- Maureen Wilson-Jarrard was recognized as our Membership Communication Coordinator. Serving in this critical role, she has efficiently sent out our Vision newsletter and all-member messages.
- We recognized our Communication Team for excellence in improving and producing our Vision newsletter, our Branch website, and our Facebook page. They are Ellen Fowler, Pat Brewer, Elaine Sweet, Chris Licata, and Alice Mallory.
- We recognized a committee from our Public Policy Team who
 initiated the "Women on Boards" proposal, which is now Oregon
 HB 3110, and requires women and underserved minorities to be
 represented on publicly traded corporate boards. They are Ann Bard,
 Regina Ayars, Sonja Friedman, Julie Benezet, and Mary Renaud.

As your Funds chair, I would like to take this opportunity to bring you up-to-date on recent news from National AAUW. Economic security, education, and advocacy are our focus.

- We lead the fight for fair pay and economic opportunity for women and the battle continues. Women still earn 82 cents for every dollar paid to a man and men continue to dominate the top roles and highest-paying professions.
- We train women to negotiate for pay and benefits and to pursue leadership roles.
- Our legal advocacy team has supported plaintiffs in more than 125 gender equity legal cases. There is news to share on this: The National AAUW Legal Advocacy Fund is fully endowed in perpetuity.
- We have awarded over \$115 million in fellowships and grants, one of the largest scholarship programs for women in the world.

Finally, there is AAUW's body of research. It is AAUW's review of the literature and preparation of reports that inspires me. Recent studies are entitled: "Factory Flaw: the Attrition and Retention of Women in Manufacturing" and "The Power Gap Among Top Earners at America's Elite Universities".

PUBLIC POLICY

HB 3110 - Diversity on Corporate Boards

HB 3110, the bill in the Oregon legislature requiring diversity on the boards of public companies headquartered in Oregon, is still being worked on in the House Rules Committee. The Committee has asked for a legislative fiscal report to be prepared. A "fiscal" is prepared whenever a state agency, and therefore the state budget, might be financially impacted by legislation. In this case the Secretary of State's Office will be enforcing the law and that action may require additional funding.

There have been some amendments to the original bill. They include reducing penalties for failure to comply and changing the numbers for board diversity. The initial draft provided that if there are four to nine board members, then at least two had to be women or people from underrepresented communities. The new draft provides that there must be a minimum of one woman and one person from an underrepresented community on the board. The problem with the initial numerical setup is that it established a quota system which would face a stiff challenge in court, as well as the potential for being struck down as unconstitutional. Yes, men would claim that they were being unconstitutionally discriminated against, and the law in Oregon seems to give that argument some substance.

As of this writing, HB 3110 has been passed by the House! Public Policy is very optimistic that it will become law.

Vote by May 18

Local elections matter! During a difficult year we have learned the importance of local leadership. When leaders in Washington failed to act, governors, mayors, and school board members had to make decisions affecting the health and survival of our communities. Local officials play a huge role in our lives, from childcare, roads, parks, policing, and school policies, to city and county budgets and taxes. Clearly, local elections can have consequences. Yet, nationwide only 27% of eligible voters participate in typical local elections. Consequently, a small segment of the community determines policy for everyone.

In Jackson County we will have one ballot measure to consider in May. In 2016 we supported a tax levy to support the Rogue Valley Transportation District to increase routes to underserved neighborhoods and provide service on Saturdays and evenings. This levy will be expiring and must be renewed if these services are to continue. This does not raise taxes. In addition, there are a number of school district director positions in competition and an election for the Jackson County Fire Protection Director and RVTD directors.

Ballots were mailed April 30 and the last day to register was April 27. The ballot drop boxes at the libraries opened Monday May 3. The deadline for voting is 8 pm, May 18. While I was out of town this winter and having my mail forwarded, I was removed from the voter roll so I learned it is always a good idea to check your voter registration at www.oregonvotes. gov. After casting your ballot you can track your ballot at orgeonvotes.gov/myvote.

Democracy works best when everyone's voice is heard.

AAUW National Election

AAUW National is asking members to vote by May 17 on two items:

- 1. Bylaws Amendment on Open Membership. This change would eliminate the membership requirement of holding a college degree, associates or higher, and open membership to any "individual who supports the AAUW mission." The change would also eliminate student memberships.
- **2.** Changes to Public Policy Priorities. AAUW members vote every two years on revisions to our Public Policy Priorities. This year, the proposed changes are:
 - Refinement and added specificity regarding AAUW's commitment to addressing systemic racism
 - Refinement of our commitment to equitable access to higher education for all
 - Emphasis on the importance of high-quality data collection



AAUW of Oregon Annual Meeting and State Convention Report

AAUW of Oregon held its state convention by Zoom on April 18. Our Branch was well represented by delegates Catherine Lutes, Bessie Azari, Gretchen King, Peggy Audibert, Kathleen Mackris, and Gail Engblom. For the first time, ALL Oregon counties were represented at the convention!

They keynote speaker was Jessica Vega Pederson, a member of the Multnomah County Commission, former state legislator, and author of the groundbreaking report, "Pre-School for All." She spearheaded a two-year-long process that gathered community leaders from across many sectors, including education, business, housing, healthcare, and parents, to craft a ballot measure which would levy an income tax on the county's highest earners to pay for preschool. In November 2020, Multnomah County voters approved the ballot measure, Pre-School for All," with 64 percent support.

During the awards portion of the program, our Ashland Branch was singled out for being the number 3 branch for AAUW Funds donations, and Paula Wiiken and Sylvie Whitman were named 2020 Major Gift Donors Named Honorees! So well-deserved! In addition, Pam Shay was unanimously elected as South District Chair.

The delegates also adopted a detailed proposal for action and communication for 2021-2023, setting forth overall goals and legislative priorities.
